Unlocking Success: A Student's Guide to Upskilling and Reskilling

Upskilling is the process of training to build upon skills you already have, while reskilling is focused on learning new skills. Improving your skill set can help you both be more employable and keep up with changes in industry. Here are some tips on how you can accomplish this:

Identify Skills:

The first step you should undertake is to identify your current skills, your strengths and weaknesses, and any new skills you want to learn. By identifying where your weaknesses are, you can focus on upskilling those areas. Use Skills Checker, a self-assessment available on Careers Zone 24/7 (log in via the <u>Student Futures website</u>) which provides you with a clear picture of the areas you excel in and those that need improvement. This programme then offers advice on how to improve your skills. If there is a new skill you want to gain to improve your CV, or think it would improve your current job role, start by researching ways that would help you learn this skill.

Resources in Your Current Job:

One way for you to start your upskilling or reskilling research is to enquire with your current organisation. Often companies will offer resources that allow employees to go through the process of upskilling/reskilling. They might have conferences you can attend, internal e-learning programmes, webinars, or they may even sponsor you to attend a course. Employees' upskilling is beneficial to companies, so it is worth asking your manager and co-workers about the opportunities available within the workplace. You could also research the skills that are in demand in your industry and specifically focus on them.

Online Courses:

Online courses, seminars, and conferences are some of the best ways to enhance your skills and develop new ones.
